Is there proper signage directing you to police, sheriff, city hall, etc.

## **III. Economic Indicators:**

• Employment Opportunities:

What types of businesses and industries are present?

What is the predominant business climate (light or heavy industry, retail, hospitality)?

Do people need to seek employment elsewhere?

Commercial Districts:

What condition are storefronts and signage in?

How many retail stores are open, and what goods do they sell?

## • Investment in New Businesses:

Is there visible evidence of new business construction or openings?

#### Vacancies:

Are there "For Sale" or "For Lease" signs, and where are they located?

#### • Financial Institutions:

What types of banks, credit unions, and ATMs are present?

### • Economic Assistance Programs:

Are there visible signs of job fairs, microloan offices, or other economic assistance resources?

#### Industry Presence:

Is there a variety of businesses? What are the local industries and businesses?

#### • Retail and Services:

Do businesses provide necessities like groceries and medications?

What is the store atmosphere, prices, and selection?

Where do people shop?

What kinds of goods are available?

## IV. Infrastructure and Transportation:

### Road Conditions:

Are roads in good repair or in disrepair?

## • Public Transportation:

Is there evidence of public transportation?

Is it well used and easy to navigate?

## • Traffic:

How heavy is the traffic?

Is it primarily commercial or private vehicles?

## Parking and Loading Zones:

Are there adequate parking and loading zones to support commercial activity?

## Accessibility:

Are there architectural barriers (e.g., lack of ramps, bike lanes)?

# V. Social and Community Life:

#### Housing:

What is the age and condition of housing?

Are they well-maintained or in need of repair?

Public Spaces:

Are parks and other public spaces well-maintained and used?

Are there sports facilities?

Are there visible examples of arts & culture projects in the community?

• Public Services:

Are there visible health and social service providers (clinics, food banks, shelters)?

Education:

Are there schools, colleges, or libraries in the area?

Recreation:

Where do children play? What forms of recreation are present?

• Religious Centers:

What types of religious institutions are present?

Community Gathering Spots:

Are there common areas where people gather (e.g., parks, community centers, cafes)?
